



The Cogenhoe Dig

Newsletter No 2. May 2021

We had a committee meeting earlier this week and it was agreed to take investigations forward.

MOLA have been asked to firm-up proposals for a LIDAR survey by drone which will allow us to be very clear about the best spots to investigate. Terry is looking into available grant funding.

We are also compiling a manual of all known information relevant to archaeology in the local area. This has brought out some very interesting information.

There is a scheduled ancient monument to the east of the village which consists of a Neolithic/Bronze age barrow. Whilst we wouldn't be allowed to disturb that site, we have uncovered crop marks on aerial photographs which clearly suggest something similar in other fields.

The known information about the old Norman Village to the south of the church makes this a tempting potential site for a long term dig – maybe not as exciting as the Roman site at Piddington which has been under excavation for some 35 years.

Previously, we promised that there wouldn't be mummies, but next month I am having a day to dig up Romans in the Roman cemetery at Chester House. So where are our Normans buried?

Previously we promised that there wouldn't be Dinosaurs, but locally there have been finds of a



Woolly Rhinoceros and Mammoth. In Northampton, the tooth of a Rhinoceros was discovered whilst building the Gas Works. Hopefully we shall find more than a four-legged rat catcher.



We did promise bits of pots and indeed this type was discovered here in 2018 along with Neolithic flints, Bronze Age

fragments and a George II half-penny.

We will keep in touch as this moves forward.
